We'd like to meet with you to discuss how the patent system is harming inventors and entrepreneurs, especially women and minorities, and what you can do.


Without your help just a few very large companies will continue to dominate the U.S. economy. They will persist in exploiting our data and ideas. They get to choose what innovations come to market at what price and under what conditions and who gets credit.

We've followed the rules and paid our fees to the USPTO but we do not enjoy the exclusive right to our inventions explicitly guaranteed to us in the Constitution. Today the fashion is to let big companies steal and force inventors to litigate again and again, burning through precious time and what little cash we may have. This ploy is called "efficient infringement" and we'd like you to hold a hearing on this topic.



We look forward to sharing our stories with you and to correcting the misinformation that has spoiled the public record.






